To accomplish the task of covering substantial syllabi within prescribed limit, teachers find lecture method to be the most feasible mode of teaching. However, student learning is continuously measured and sincere efforts are made to engage students in discussions.

- Discussion enable students to reflect on the topic discussed which is necessary to anchor learning and stimulate deeper thinking and understanding.
- Brain storming sessions enable students to identify their creative abilities, increase their learning capacity and develop analytical skills.
- Students are motivated to attend extension lectures by external experts to generate interest and awareness among the students.
- Assignments are also given which helps the student to explore various learning sources to develop reasoning capability.
- Fostering the culture of knowledge acquisition through wider self-exposure to latest knowledge through internet.
- Faculty is provided with incentives in form of duty leave and academic leave to enable them to participate in seminars.

3.26 Major Activities during the year in the sphere of extension activities and Institutional Social Responsibility

- **NCC**

The NCC wing of the college carried out many activities during the session 2016-17. Our cadets participated in TSC, ATC and CATC camps and won prizes in various competitions like Declamation Competition, Drill Competition and other cultural Competitions. NCC Wing organized 3rd International Yoga Day in college campus on 21-06-2017.

- **NSS**

The NSS unit of the college is working with missionary zeal under the guidance of Programme Officer. A campaign Vittiya Saksharta Abhiyan (VISAKA) was carried out from 21-12-2016 to 10-01-2017. Our volunteers were trained to make digital payment transactions. Various methods like UPI, USSD and Digital Wallets etc. were taught to them by organising a workshop. These trained volunteers then motivated local residents as well as Bahadur Khera village residents to adopt digital payment methods.

- **Arya Yuva Samaj**

Arya Yuva Samaj conducted various activities. A committee of students was constituted and office bearers were nominated. Activities like Rishi Bodh Utsav, Debate Competition and extension lectures on morality were carried out.

- **Red Cross Society**

Red Cross Society was constituted and office bearers were nominated. The society organized a blood group check up as well as Blood Donation Camp on 11-08-2016 in collaboration with Civil Hospital team. An oath taking ceremony was also conducted and students took an oath to work for the welfare of society.

- **Women's Studies Centre**

To uplift the Women in different areas, Women's Studies Centre organized a 15-day camp where female students were trained for self defence. During this self defence camp 150 students participated and they were trained by Coach Ms. Sunita. A workshop was also organised to train the students about karate and judo. The main focus of this centre was to enable the students for their self defence. The co-ordinator also extended various discourses pertaining to women empowerment as resource person. She was also awarded by Brahma Kumari Manch and Punjabi Sabhyachar Manch.

- **Student Legal Literacy Club**

Student Legal Literacy Club held National Voter Day workshop and various activities like Poster Making, Slogan Writing, Rangoli were convened. The main aim of this workshop was to make the youngsters aware of their rights of vote and how to use this right in a proper way.

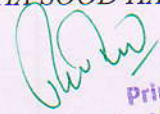
